# Hep A found at local eatery

undreds of patrons of a popular southwest Calgary restaurant may have been exposed to the hepatitis A virus, after a food handler tested positive follow-

ing a trip to southeast Asia.

The Wildwood Grill and Brewing Company voluntarily closed its doors early Tuesday after officials from the Calgary Health Region told them a female staff member had tested positive for the virus.

A downtown clinic was opened Tuesday night to handle hundreds of potentially infected customers and members, including pregnant women and small children.

The health region is calling

for anyone who ate at the 4th Street SW. restaurant between April 30 and Mother's Day to attend vaccination clinics set up specifically to deal with the potential outbreak.

"I feel in shock right now," said Jim Perry, 33, who was vaccinated after having lunch at Wildwood on May 8.

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## Signs of hepatitis A

- Hepatitis A is an infection of the liver caused by a virus.

## Driver jailed 30 months

**√**he parents of hit-and-run victim Lindsay Gia-comelli got precious little comfort Tuesday when a judge sentenced the driver who struck and killed their daughter in a crosswalk and left her for dead in 2005 to a precedent-set-

ting 30 months in prison.
"It seems to be, in my view, contrary to what the intent of the law is where you stay put," Ger-Giacomelli, Lindsay's fathe said outside court after Colin Jones was led away to begin serving his time for the crime. "How can you have a law that has a maximum life in prison and someone goes to the extent he did and get 30 months? To me, it doesn't make sense."

Court of Queen's Bench Jus-tice Allen Sulatycky, who pro-hibited Jones from driving for five years, said it was "impor-tant the public gets the mes-sage that leaving the scene of an accident can't enable a person to escape civil or criminal consequences."

# Give **UofC** fair cut: MLAs

U of A got \$400M more in last 3 years

he University of Calgary has re-ceived about \$400 million less in provincial funding than the University of Alberta over the past few years, argue Calgary Tory MLAs who are calling on their government to level the "inequities" between the two institutions.

In a rare occurrence of bipartisanship, Calgary Liberals have joined their Conservative foes in taking up the U of C's fight, insisting the university is getting "shortchanged." The U of C has received \$270

million in capital funding over the last three years — about \$364 million less than the \$634 million sent to the U of A, according to Calgary-Nose Hill Tory MLA Neil Brown.

Making matters worse, the U of C also is getting short-changed on its program budgets as well, he said, pointing to data showing it receives an

average of \$10,105 per full-time student in operating grants — \$1,269 less than what the U of A

st,269 less than what the U of A receives (sti,374).

"There is some historical inequities in there," Brown told the Herald on Tuesday. "We're hoping that's going to be one of the government's priorities in this budget."

The Stelmach government's capital budget for the next three years has \$300 million remaining to be allocated to post-secondary projects, and Brown is hoping many of those dollars will be directed to Calgary.

Advanced Education Minister Doug Horner is out of the country on business and could-n't be reached for comment.

The long-held argument for providing more cash to the U of A has been that it offers certain specialty colleges and programs that the U of C doesn't, which requires more dollars per student and increased capital spending on buildings.
